Let's Talk: Campus Dialog on Mission and Values (Classroom C503)

This session describes how our college shared leadership in a participative dialog about the college's mission and core values. Early in our strategic planning process, we made a decision to involve stakeholders in leading the discussion with colleagues and students. While also building buy-in for the mission and the subsequent strategic plan, the involvement of colleagues was a necessity because of the complexity of our multi-campus environment. Using this approach, the college planner became coach and coordinator for colleagues leading the dialog. This process represents a best practice for community colleges although the methods can transfer to any sector.

Every Student is at Risk: Improving Learning, Retention and Satisfaction (LYNN R213)

This interactive seminar is designed for educators who seek further development in creating student persistence strategies connected to the overall goals of learning, retention and satisfaction. Topics include: orientation is a two-way street, eliminating the barriers YOU create that hinder student success, other duties not assigned, avoiding burnout, data driven decisions/programming, campus politics 101, (in) voluntary withdrawal testimonials and the road to graduation. Each participant leaves with an "Educator Swagger Score," and a wealth of resources essential for professional development and student achievement. The session concludes with "Memoirs of a Child Almost Left Behind," as the presenter shares details of the retention encounters that transformed his life.

Men in Scrubs Project: Impact of Social Determinants on Academic Achievement of African American Males Majoring in the Health Professions (LYNN R214)

This session presents findings from a study which examined perceived impacts of multi-level social forces on African American males' classroom achievement. The Sullivan Commission on Diversity in the Healthcare Workforce found that in contrast to the growing trend of minorities comprising a growing percentage of the U.S. population, their representation among health professions was declining. Rates of representation for African American males was even more alarming. Baltimore City Community College received a grant from Kaiser Permanente entitled the "Men In Scrubs Project" to provide mentoring, academic support, and exposure to the health professions for men of color. Students were asked to provide feedback on (a) factors that influenced their decision to choose a major in healthcare; (b) their perceptions of job options within the field; and, (c) the level of impact that perceived challenges had on achieving their academic goals.



Comprehensive Strategy to Attract and Retain African American Students in the Cybersecurity Program (LYNN R227)

There is an alarming shortage of African Americans in cybersecurity. Data from the United States Department of Labor – Bureau of Labor Statistics puts the figure of 'Black or African American' people in the information security analysis jobs at 3%; WiCyS reports the overall figure as 7%. With increased proliferation and sophistication of cyberattacks and extreme shortage of skilled workers in the field of cybersecurity, it is critical to recruit and train African Americans to become a vital part of the national security team. The presenter will share experiences and strategies helpful in recruiting and retaining more students in the field of cybersecurity.

NCBAA-NE Dissertation of the Year Research Showcase: Impact of Intended and Unintended Outcomes of Performance-Based Funding on Community Colleges (LYNN R234)

With an increased focus on fiscal responsibility and accountability in higher education, state and federal policymakers are designing and implementing various performance-based funding models. However, funding models have focused primarily on four-year institutions, and have not considered the unique institutional mission, and population that community colleges serve. This has led to intended and unintended outcomes for community colleges. This presentation discusses the systematic review methodology used to evaluate the impact of outcomes of performance-based funding. The findings provide institutional leaders an adaptive strategic planning framework and metrics more closely aligned with the institutional mission, and population served, to maximize desirable outcomes and minimize undesirable outcomes for their respective institutions.

Shifting Demographics, Sharper Focus: Successful Retention Strategies for First Generation and Students of Color (LYNN R234)

The presenters will share various retention strategies from programs such as the First Year Experience, Black Male Initiative, Summer Bridge, and Adelante, a summer program for Hispanic students. Since Anne Arundel's Community College's Student Achievement and Success Program (SAPS's) beginning, the fall-to-fall retention rate has met or exceeded the College's overall retention rate. The presenters will conclude with a discussion on the initiative to scale SASP as part of the College's new strategic plan, Engagement Matters: Pathways to Completion. Status of the work will be shared, including how a sharper focus on retention and completion will help broaden the role of SASP and its impact on student success college-wide.

Inclusive Visioning: Advancing Diversity Through Team Imagining (LYNN C503)

The session will present the Inclusive Visioning System, which is a management tool and strategic approach for unleashing the power of diversity. American society is experiencing major demographic shifts that are already impacting the racial and ethnic composition of its colleges and universities. Academic leaders need new tools to increase their organizations intra-cultural literacy and flatten hierarchical systems that no longer advance their goals and in fact may impede their global competitiveness and their ability to attract top-notch students and talents from around the world. The session will 1) explain the IV System and how it can improve strategic planning and decision making; 2) describe how to recognize, understand and leverage intra-cultural variability; 3) explain how to move beyond "thinking outside the box" and learn how to "deconstruct the box" and 4) develop relational processes that push power down and eliminate systemic barriers to institutional growth.




